LTBB TRIBAL CITIZEN JANNAN CORNSTALK HONORED FOR ORGANIZING PIPE OUT PADDLE PROTESTS

For her efforts in organizing the Pipe Out Paddle Protests the last three years, LTBB Tribal Citizen Jannan Cornstalk received the 2018 Environmentalist of the Year award in the Volunteer category from the Northern Michigan Environmental Action Council (NMEAC).

Since 1988, NMEAC has annually recognized individuals and groups doing environmental work in the Northern Michigan region. She was unable to attend the award ceremony in Traverse City, MI, on April 13, 2018 because a snowstorm delayed her flight from Duluth, MN, where she was asked to speak on a grassroots organizing panel at the Rising Voices 6 Climate Change workshop.

"I was surprised when JoAnne (Bier Beemon, a past award recipient and environmentalist) called me and said she wanted to nominate me for the award," Cornstalk said. "The award is really nice because it recognizes me for my hard work, but it was truly a collaborative effort. I'm the main organizer, but lots of people help. (LTBB Tribal Citizen) Andrea Pierce is the main person who helps me organize the events. I can't do it by myself. I feel the Creator used me to bring people together."

The Pipe Out Paddle Protests have brought together people of all ages and all walks of life to Mackinaw City, MI, to rally against and raise awareness of Enbridge Line 5. The flotillas have included kayaks and canoes.

"Vicki (Kelley) and I were invited to an event in Mackinaw City in regards to Enbridge Line 5, and I was asked to speak there," Cornstalk said. "After I finished speaking there, I thought, 'I'm tired of talking, I have to do something.' When they were protesting a pipeline in

Meet the Band

There may be only two "ingredients" to this band, but boy, do they know how to put together one heck of a musical stew. Sean Miller handles the guitar duties while Traven Michaels mans the saxophone. Both men sing and play percussion, and they go way back. "We became friends at Petoskey Middle School, and started hanging out more often," Michaels explained. "We were also in jazz and marching band together through high school; we were both passionate about playing music." Miller took part in the Petoskey Steel Drum Band as well while Michaels was determined to take his own music outside of the band room.

"We used our shared enthusiasm and joined a band with a number of our friends," Michaels said. "That band evolved into a four-piece that was the original The Real Ingredients." The band dissolved briefly when both friends went to college; but they reunited and pared their lineup down to just the two of them. They've now been a band officially for two years.

And, they might be one of the hardest working bands, too.

"Over the last two years, I think we have played in almost every venue across Northern Michigan," said Miller. "That includes Beard's Brewery, City Park Grill, Stiggs Brewery, Mackinaw Trails Brewery, 7 Monks Taproom, all our local farmers markets, Pierson's, Boyne Country Club, Grand Traverse Yacht Club, Snowbelt Brewery and more."

MISS NORTH CAROLINA USA CAELYNN MILLER-KEYES USES CROWN TO ADDRESS AN UGLY, PERSONAL TRUTH: SEXUAL ASSAULT

Editor's note: The following appeared on WFMY News 2 on April 26, 2018 and is reprinted here with permission. Miss North Carolina USA Caelynn Miller-Keyes is an LTBB Descendant. Her family includes her grandmother, Marie "Tootsie" (Keshick) Miller, an LTBB Tribal Citizen, her mother, Jai-leah Miller-Kamenicky, an LTBB Tribal Citizen, her stepfather, John Kamenicky, and siblings, Arianna Miller-Keyes, Josh Kamenicky, Haydn Kamenicky and Isabella Kamenicky.

In midst of the #MeToo and #TimesUp movements, Caelynn Miller-Keyes, Miss North Carolina USA 2018, is using her title to speak up against sexual assault, and the ugly truth that has impacted her personally.

Miller-Keyes attended Virginia Commonwealth University where she studied Broadcast Journalism. It is also where she became a sexual assault survivor.

Her sophomore year, Miller-Keyes says she was sexually assaulted by one of her own friends at his fraternity house.

"My whole world was flipped upside down," the 2018 Miss NC USA shared during a press conference at the High Point Chamber of Commerce on Thursday (April 26, 2018).

The 22-year-old explained that, just like many of the



celebrities in the #MeToo and #TimesUp movements, she was terrified to accept what had happened to her and tell her loved ones from fear of being judged.

When Miller-Keyes called two friends that were at the same fraternity house that night to tell them what had happened, they said they believed they had also been assaulted and had no recollection of the events.

They realized they had all been drugged and sexually assaulted.

The LTBB Cultural Library has been keeping busy this year.

The Wiidikendming Eyaawwying Project Assistant Jeremy Steele concluded the ebook club in May. Because of so much interest, we had to purchase additional Kindles for a total of 30 readers for most of the six ebooks that were read. Miigwech to all who contributed to the success of the ebook club!

Six LTBB staff were trained to facilitate Digital Storytelling Workshops in our community. A second workshop was held April 25th-27th at the LTBB Community Building. A second digital storytelling workshop has been planned during this month with plans to hold an additional one with enough interest. Refreshments are provided for workshop participants as well as a working lunch on the last day. Genealogy information sessions are also in the works for community members. The goal is to provide basic materials and resource and organizational information on what is needed for those beginning to delve into their personal family histories using resources like Ancestry.com. There are three sessions planned with two for beginners and one for intermediate levels.

Our Free Little Libraries missed installation before winter due to their unique design and wanting to consider weather conditions and the need to maintain undamaged books for Free Library visitors. Library installation is planned for the LTBB Housing properties and at the Health Clinic in Petoskey, MI. Our Free Little Libraries were designed by Tom Teuthorn and painted by Roberta Shalifoe, who did a fantastic job. Chi miigwech!

Free books are still available for the public on a free book cart in the Commons Area of the LTBB Government Building in Harbor Springs, MI. The cart works the same as the Free Little Libraries. You are welcome to take a book and/or leave a book.

The LTBB Cultural Library continues to provide library card numbers to the community. If you're a part of our local community, in the schools,


the counties we serve or have LTBB members as family, then the library serves you as well. There is no requirement to be a tribal member. Signup is free and easy and also gives you access to the Great Lakes Digital Library consortium where there are thousands more ebooks, audiobooks and videos available to be checked out to you on your smartphones, tablets, Kindles and computers.

The LTBB Cultural Library recently ended its first Spring Reading Challenge, and we want to continue supporting summer reading with the beginning of the tribal-wide summer reading program. The LTBB Cultural Library Summer Reading Challenge is open to ALL of our LTBB community youth, both citizens and descendants, both local and non-local. We only ask that you show your support of the LTBB Cultural Library and its programming by signing up as a library patron. The Summer Reading Challenge runs from June 1st through July 20th, 2018. Registration forms and reading logs are available in the *Odawa Trails* newsletter, the LTBB Cultural Library and from the LTBB website. There has also been a CORRECTION to the May issue's registration and reading log with a revised turn-in date of July 23rd, 2018. In this summer's youth challenge, there are four age groups: 4-6 years old, 7-9 years old, 10-12 years old and 13-17 years old. We have incentive prizes for top readers in each age group, including gift certificates for pizza, subs, movies and more.



HOUSING DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

STR - Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

HIP - Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

DPA - Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

FPA - Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units.

 The Elders Department has recently changed the Food and Utility Reimbursement Program title to the Food and Utility Appropriation Allowance. Along with the title change, please note the significant changes made to the process. As of 05/08/2018:

- No receipts OR utility statements are needed to receive the \$400 allowance
- The \$400 allowance will not be considered as income, therefore, it will not affect any benefits that you are receiving OR be taxable
- To receive the \$400

allowance in a timely fashion, your address MUST be updated with Enrollment

- The new application will need to be filled out and requires the following to be provided:
 - Name
 - Tribal ID Number
 - Current Address (as listed with the Enrollment Department)
 - Date of Birth
 - Telephone Number
 - Signature

If you have received your Food and Utility Reimbursement for 2018, you do not need to apply again. If

you did not receive your full amount of \$400, we will be sending you the application in the mail for the remainder of the allowance. If we received your application in the mail after 5-8-2018, a new application will be sent to you.

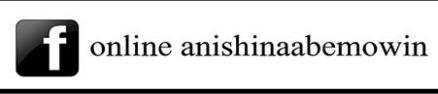

Resident Tribal Members are exempted from the following Michigan taxes:

1. Sales Tax (currently 6% of retail price) via Form 4013
2. Use Tax (currently 6% of purchase price)
3. Income Tax (4.35% of Adjusted Gross Income)
4. Michigan Business Tax (currently 4.95%)
5. *Motor Fuel Tax (currently, 36.5 cents per gallon unleaded and 32.6 cents per gallon on diesel)
6. *Tobacco Product Tax (currently \$2 per pack of cigarettes)

* All LTBB Tribal Members are entitled to the exemption on fuel and tobacco.
*The Motor Fuel and Tobacco Product Tax exemption is available at Biindigen (tribal convenience store) located at 2169 U.S. 31 North in Petoskey, MI.
*The Motor Fuel Tax exemption is also available at the BP station on the south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

TAX AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the

actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to you.

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

WORLD ELDER ABUSE AWARENESS DAY

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day began in 2006 to promote a better understanding of abuse, neglect and exploitation

Learn the signs of elder abuse, neglect and exploitation and share them with those in your life.

Visit and talk with elders in your life to **prevent isolation.**

Support caregivers by providing breaks or respite.

Speak up if you think something is wrong. To report suspected abuse, neglect or exploitation, call Central Intake at 1-855-444-3911.

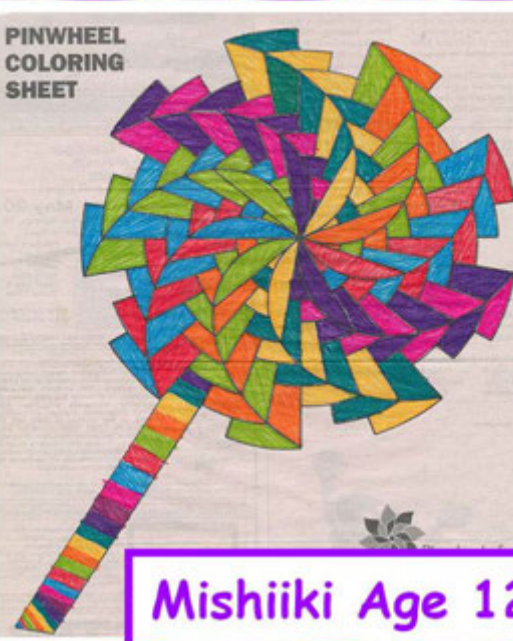

SECOND LTBB WAGANAKISING ODAWA ROUND DANCE

The Second LTBB Waganakising Odawa Round Dance was held on April 21, 2018 from 5-11 p.m. at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI.

Typically, rounds dances are held in the evening and in the late fall and winter and early spring. Many believe the Plains Cree received the round dance in the late 19th century from the Assiniboine, who called it the Moving Slowly Dance. Originally, a healing dance, it became a social dance, and in its current form, serves both social and ceremonial purposes.

At round dances, a group of singers play hand drums in unison as dancers join hands to form a large circle. The dancers move to their left with a side-shuffle step to reflect the long-short pattern of the drumbeat, bending their knees to emphasize the pattern.

Each person in attendance received a raffle ticket for door prizes, which were drawn throughout the evening.

This year, our Kikaajik (elders) were honored. All of the elders were asked to dance to their honor song. After they danced, all elders in attendance received a gift.

Matt Davis conducted the pipe ceremony while Joe Medicine served as the MC. Mike Naganashe served as Stickman, and the singers included Frank Bartley III, Patrick Naganashe, Raymond Shenoskey, Ryan Metzger, Jer-

emy Joy, James Day, Joe Syrette, Joe Smith, Paul Shananaquet and Gary Gibson.

Youth singers included Carter Boda, Grayson Boda, Adian Day, James Robinson and Zhaawon Smith.

The Round Dance Committee included Pauline Boulton, Theresa Chingwa, Phil Harmon, Deleta Smith, Arlene Naganashe, Vicky Kelley, Matt Davis, Celestine Petoskey, Jannan Cotto and Cody Big John.

This year, some of our youth teamed up with head staff to observe, help and ask questions. They also helped committee members throughout the evening when needed. Youth helpers included Olivia Petoskey, Taden Shaliofoe, Amanda Spearman, Kamryn Schaeffer, Nimkii Naganashe, Autumn Naganashe, Waawaaskone Gibson, Kaiyah Keshick-Eady, Hiram Walker-Gross and Kunu, Nizu and Haga Yellowbank.

Our adult helpers included Collene Medicine, Matt Boulton, Ryan Stillwell, Clint Boulton, Scott Kelley, Carla Osawamick, Joanne Carey, Sarah John, Christine Peavey, Dawn Shenoskey, Mary Powell, Angela Carney, Wendy Congdon and Lindsay Walker, who helped us with recycling our food waste into compost, paper and plastic products. With approximately 275 people in attendance, we only had an impressive two bags of non-recyclables. Miigwech (thank you) to Lindsay and those who brought feast bags.

RESTORATION OF GREENSKY HILL INDIAN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH EARNS ACCOLADES



During the Michigan Historic Preservation Network's 38th Annual Conference on May 18, 2018, the Michigan Historic Preservation Network (MHPN) jointly honored the congregation of the Greensky Hill Indian United Methodist Church, the Grand Traverse Bay Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, Hayes Township, the Northern Lakes Economic Alliance, John Dziurman Architects and In-

dian River Custom Log Homes with its community award for restoring the Greensky Hill Indian United Methodist Church.

Located in Hayes Township, MI, near Charlevoix, MI, the 19th century church has served as a significant American Indian heritage and cultural site for generations of community members. When the congregation noticed some rather significant structural issues several years ago, they began looking for a way to restore the church while not disturbing its historic character. They received a grant from the Grand Traverse Bay Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians with Hayes Township and the Northern Lakes Economic Alliance supporting the church through the granting process. The restoration was guided by John Dziurman Architects and Indian River Custom Log Homes with many members of the congregation and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians joining in the effort. Through this collaborative project, the log structure was restored.

REIKI AND ITS BENEFITS



Reiki is a Japanese technique for stress reduction and relaxation that also promotes healing.

It is administered by "laying on hands" and is based on the idea that an unseen "life force energy" flows through us and is what causes us to be alive. “My heart stopped at that moment because at that point I still, again, didn’t know the extent as to what had happened to me,” she explained.

In the beginning, she only wanted to be tested for drugs to confirm her suspicions, but none of the doctors and hospitals she went to would test her for drugs.

“Each doctor turned me away, they said, ‘Unless I filed a police report, they couldn’t help me,’” Miller-Keyes said.

Part of Miller-Keyes advocacy today is also educating about what a person should do after they’ve been sexually assaulted since she didn’t know when it was her turn.

“I didn’t know what you should do when you report, I didn’t know what my rights were, I didn’t know what the process was,” she said.

According to Miller-Keyes, by the time she was hospitalized and tested, too much time had passed and her drug tests came back inconclusive.

After more investigation, Miller-Keyes found out that she was assaulted by not one, but two men. That was the decisive moment in her journey as a survivor that finally made her report the assault and open up about what had happened.

“These are guys that I did YoungLife with, these are guys that went to high schools around me, I knew these guys for years,” she explains.

Miller-Keyes says there’s a lot of room for improvement in the rape kit and sexual assault exam-

ination process, especially how long they take to process, which she experienced herself.

She explains how the wait was daunting.

“This is before the #MeToo movement really lit up, this is before the #TimesUp movement, this is even before the Rolling Stone article,” Miller-Keyes said. “It was such a taboo topic.”

Miller-Keyes explains that her case with VCU went over the time period Title IX states a case must be completed. Her case, presented in front of “two peers and a faculty member,” resulted against her.

She used that loss as a platform to address to the university the failures in the way these cases are treated, which helped eliminate the “two peers and a faculty member” style of Title IX hearing at VCU.

During her time as Miss North Carolina USA, her goal is to improve Title IX policies for sexual assault survivors by addressing potential policy changes at colleges and universities around the state.

“I wanted my voice to be heard as Miss North Carolina USA and hopefully as Miss USA,” she added.

Much of Miller-Keyes focus so far has been working to improve Title IX policies at her alma mater, like the case but hopes #MeToo and #TimesUp will keep the momentum going.

“I think they have been instrumental in people feeling comfortable coming forward and people reporting,” she explained.

“Cornstalk” continued from page 1. the Puget Sound, they did a flotilla. We thought, ‘Let’s do that here. We can raise awareness of this pipeline and be in the water we are trying to protect.’

Enbridge’s Line 5 is a 645-mile, 30-inch diameter pipeline that carries crude oil and natural gas and travels through Michi-



gan’s Upper and Lower Peninsulas, originating in Superior, WI, and terminating in Sarnia, Ontario, Canada. As it travels under the Straits of Mackinac, Line 5 splits into two 20-inch diameter, parallel pipelines that are buried onshore and taper off deep underwater, crossing the Straits west of the Mackinac Bridge for a distance of 4.5 miles.

“The Great Lakes are one of the greatest fresh water resources in the world, that’s 20 percent of the world’s fresh water,” Cornstalk said. “If there was a spill, the lakes would never be the same, and it would affect 40 million people.”

The pipeline was built in 1953.

“Anything man made is going to break eventually,” Cornstalk said. “It has a lot of stressors on it. Just the metal being in the water and the zebra mussels have corroded the pipeline. The waters there can be contentious because of its temperature and water flow.”

On November 27, 2017, Enbridge and the State of Michigan, through Governor Rick Snyder, signed an agreement to “improve coordination between Enbridge and the State for the operation and maintenance of Enbridge’s Line 5 pipeline located in Michigan, while providing enhanced transparency to the citizens of Michigan.” The agreement required the replacement of a section of Line 5 under the St. Clair River and a study exploring the possibility of replacing the entire pipeline with a new one in a tunnel. Enbridge is supposed to evaluate three options for eventually replacing Line 5 by June.

“That was a slap in the face,” Cornstalk said of the agreement. “When I learned of that, I wanted to do something.”

Cornstalk and others are currently organizing a fourth Pipe Out Paddle Protest to be held on September 1, 2018 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Mackinaw City, MI. They are working to bring in a contingency of people from Hawaii and the Nisqually Tribes and to set a record for the world’s largest flotilla.

“Their canoes are amazing,”

Cornstalk said. “We feel like their canoes will draw people in. We’ve been trying to think of ways to raise awareness at a national level. We need prayers and help to bring this to the national level.”

“They both have a real ability to connect with people,” Cornstalk said. “I like the way they are both passionate about what they do and that they do it in a very humble way.”

Cornstalk is Huron Potawatomi, Odawa and Saginaw Chippewa. Her parents are the late Frank Cornstalk and the late Emma Willis. She has three children, Jannan Cotto, Cari Callaghan and Motega Cotto, and six grandchildren.

the pace. The Real Ingredients have a whopping 40-plus gigs already booked, spanning from Petoskey, MI, to Traverse City, MI, to Holland, MI, and across the state.

Their Inspiration

When The Real Ingredients started, the band’s goal was simply to write some new original material together, focusing on upbeat folk, rock and funk.

“Beyond that, we just wanted to get one gig,” Miller said. They accomplished both of those goals early on, notching the second toward the end of their first summer as a band when they got a gig in Harbor Springs, MI, playing to some family members and friends. As their audience expanded, so has their repertoire. The band focuses on a mix of half original tunes and half covers.

While fans old and new can find the band’s music on Facebook, the pair are working on a way to get even more of their originals into their fans’ hands.

“We are currently working on a four-song EP here in Petoskey,” Michaels said. “We hope to finish it before this summer, to have music readily available for people to grab at our upcoming performances.”

This first EP is something they plan to use as more of a promotional device; they don’t plan on charging for the EP other than by putting a tip jar out.

“Some current goals of ours are to spread our music and build our fan base,” said Michaels. “But

for those interested, we do also have stickers and a handful of T-shirts that will be available at our upcoming shows.”

Farm Fresh

When you hear the band’s name, the first thing that springs to mind most often is food. And The Real Ingredients twist that to their advantage.

“Our catchphrase is that we play music that’s ‘funky, folky, fun and farm-fresh,’” Michaels said. The name came to the band after hanging out together for a few weeks, over — you guessed it — a meal. “We were all sitting around Sean’s table eating tacos, and saw that the salsa was made with ‘the real ingredients,’ he continued, “and now, we definitely use puns based upon our name!”

Future Ingredients

“Obviously, we’ve achieved our original goals,” Michaels said. “But we’ve come up with more goals to push ourselves even further.” After finishing up that EP, they’ve got even bigger studio ideas to aim at. “We’ve got a full album slated for a year from now, featuring more of our original songs,” Miller said. “Other than that, we hope to play as far across the state as possible, and also to get into more festivals next year. We just want to keep playing music and doing what we love.

Our program is designed to provide services needed to both parent and newborn up to the age of five years.

Maajtaag Mnoobmaadziid is designed to complement, but not replace obstetrical and pediatric medical care. In addition to providing support and education during pregnancy, there is also a focus on helping women become and stay healthy before and after pregnancy. We affirm the sacred role of women in the community as givers of life and promote understanding of the importance of family well-being and the health of women throughout the lifespan.
